Human Resource Enrichment and the Role of Regional Cooperation

Job generation has been a challenging undertaking for both developing and developed states. For several decades, the Philippines has struggled to reduce unemployment and provide just employment for the populace. While job creation is an expedient economic initiative, other relevant issues such as labor development, just compensation, and well-being of workers should also be explored further. Regional and bilateral arrangements such as the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and Southeast Asian economic partnership agreements (EPA) with Japan offer insightful models for human resource enrichment. This session focuses on human resource enrichment programs and projects by the government and on the role of regional cooperation and regional integration in job generation and human development in the Philippines.

Economic Development, Peace and Order, and Regional Cooperation

This session focuses on strategies being pursued by the government (in relation to drug menace, reconstruction efforts in Marawi, and peacebuilding in Mindanao) and on the role of regional cooperation in realizing the goals of a peaceful and stable society.
